Finding the "Way Forward" through friendship

The sound of laughter spills from a second-floor conference room at IPPL and into the hallway or adjoining rooms on a typical Tuesday afternoon. Passers-by may look through the window, see six women gathered around a table, art supplies spread out before them, and wonder, what's happening in there that is so much fun?

Inside, the six women–Betti, Cathy, Helen, Katherine, Sharon, and Susie–are catching up on their lives since the last time they gathered, which was only the previous week. They meet at the same time (1 p.m.) on the same day (Tuesday) every week to work on art projects together. They share laughs, updates on their personal lives, and just about anything else they can think of.

But, their time together is not only about chatting. The main reason they meet every week is to create art together, though none of them will say they are capital-A artists even if their works suggest otherwise.

Digging deep

The women bonded in the summer of 2022 while participating in the Artist's Way Journey, a 14-week program at IPPL based on Julia Cameron's book *The Artist's Way* and led by local artist Laura Lein-Svencner. The program encouraged participants to dig deep into their emotions and share them with the group, a process designed to unblock their creativity.

The process worked. "I've done more with my art in the last nine months than I did in the previous 35 years," Betti said. She's the group's informal spokesperson who majored in art but didn't pursue it after graduation. "This group has really sparked my creativity and enthusiasm. Even my family noticed a difference in me. I've never considered myself an easy person to get to know. But, my sisters say they've seen significant

change in that regard. And, it's because of this group."



The women say experiencing the class was transformational. The emotional process forged an especially strong connection among these six women in particular. When the class ended in early October 2022, they weren't ready to say goodbye.

So, they committed to continue meeting on their own, forming a collective they named The Way Forward in Art. That commitment remains strong, even a year later.

"We wanted to do more because we felt very connected to each other," Helen said. "The library was very generous in letting us use a room each week, which has helped us stay together." Sharon went even further, saying, "If it wasn't for the library's support we wouldn't have this group. The staff and everybody made us feel like maybe we were onto something."

Each week the women agree on a project to complete over the upcoming week (sometimes longer depending on the complexity). They spend the first part of their meetings reviewing the results and encouraging each other. The second part is for working.

A collective display

Because they all have different strengths and interests, their individual results vary on each project. Nowhere was that more visible than when they displayed their art in the IPPL second-floor gallery and in one of the display cases during June 2023.

Encouraged by staff to exhibit their art at the library, the women at first were hesitant. "We were told the gallery has multiple walls to be filled," Susie said. "Walls? You mean, multiple walls? We maybe had enough to fill the small area by the staircase. But, in those nine months we created everything for that exhibit and did all the framing."

Their meetings aren't exactly set in stone, but they may as well be. They value that time so much that they arrange their personal schedules around it. Susie sums it up best. "This time is important to us. It's a commitment we've made to each other. Nobody wants to miss out on anything that happens here. We're on a creative journey together."

Expanding creativity: The Marshall family donates to the Maker Studio

An avid sewer and all-around creative person, Joyce Marshall loves spending time in IPPL's Maker Studio. Learning about the Maker Studio from her neighbor, she started using the studio shortly after it opened two years ago.

Joyce has created everything from custom pillows and signs for her real estate business to wreaths for front doors. But, her favorite thing? The collaboration she has had with other Maker Studio guests.

"I was working on a project, and there was a girl working nearby at the embroidery machine. We had a lovely interaction about an app she used—something I never knew about. Then, another time, I saw someone struggling on the Cricut—I was able to help her," said Joyce. "Being able to connect with others while being creative is inspirational."

Joyce said the reason this kind of interaction happens organically is because of IPPL and the Maker Studio staff.

"The library and the very friendly staff foster creativity, collaboration, and learning," said Marshall. "And, I wanted to be part of that."

Recognizing the need for advanced sewing options, Marshall donated the funds to purchase a new

serger. Serger is a type of sewing machine that is primarily designed to seam, trim, and finish the edges of fabrics for a clean, professional look. Last fall, she also donated funds to purchase a computer and embroidery software for the Maker Studio.

"I love that my family was able to contribute to the learning that takes place at IPPL," said Joyce. "I encourage the community to come out—you'll have a wonderful time."

Joy of reading motivates grandmother and inspires her grandchildren

Growing up in Hong Kong, Ann Fong didn't have access to libraries because there were none. Reading books just for fun wasn't a thing. The books she did read were textbooks at school.

After immigrating to the United States in 1964 at age 7, Ann became fascinated with public libraries and all they offer. She wanted to instill an appreciation of libraries in her family and to fuel their joy of reading.

"I wanted my kids and grandchildren to learn the love of reading because I never got the chance to do that," Ann said. "Now I can't pry the books out of my grandsons' hands. They're always reading."

To illustrate her point, consider that her two grandsons, Lucas and Jackson, each read more than 70 books during the summer reading program at IPPL. Their favorite genre is adventure, but they will also read almost anything that receives mention on the Caudill, Bluestem, and Monarch lists.

"Reading fuels their imaginations," Ann said. "It teaches them empathy and sympathy and that there are things bigger than themselves and their own world. Reading opened a gateway for them into these other lives." It's not just books, either. Lucas and Jackson take advantage of a whole slew of things offered at IPPL. Lucas enjoys working on computer-aided design and 3D printing in the Maker Studio. They use the computers in the Mid-Kids area to play video games. They regularly attend Mid-Kid programs, especially anything related to science, technology, engineering, art, and math. And, both boys participate in the Mid-Kids Dungeons & Dragons club.




